Student Activities

1. (Be Respectful) Ask students to give examples of how they can treat others in a good way. For example, being a good listener is a respectful thing to do. To be a good listener you (1) Look- at the person talking, (2) Hear- the person talking, and (3) Do something- to show the person you are listening.

Activity: Zoom

The person who begins the activity says, "Zoom!" and turns her or his head quickly to a neighbor on either the right or left. That person passes the "Zoom!" to the next person and so on around the circle. This activity is a good way to get children familiarize with looking at each other.

2. **(Be Responsible)** Go over with students all the equipment and materials needed for each class. Go over the steps for Following Directions: (1) <u>Hear</u>- the teacher (2) <u>Ask</u>- if you don't know how to do something, ask a question, and (3) <u>Check</u>- what you did to make sure you followed the directions

Activity: "Simon Says."

- 3. **(Be Safe)** Have the students list unsafe situations in school and brainstorm solutions for making the situation safer.
- 4. **(Do your job!)** Practice with students how they can pay attention to their work even when others are trying to distract: (1) <u>Think</u> about what is bothering you and not letting you pay attention to your work, (2) <u>Ask</u>- the person to stop, (3) <u>Don't Look</u>- at the person, and (4) <u>Talk</u>- to yourself. Tell yourself, "This doesn't bother me."

Role Play: Demonstrate politely asking someone to stop. One person is reading a book. One person is doing something distracting, such as tapping a pencil or drumming fingers. The reader asks nicely, "Please stop doing that." The other person stops.

After the Lesson

- 1. Periodically ask the students to tell you how they will show being a good listener.
- 2. Ask your students in what way were they Responsible in class.
- 3. Ask the students in what way they helped the school to be safe
- 4. Have students share what they have done in the past to ignore a distracting classmate.
